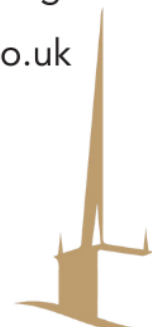

# Rector's Reflection



## Nurturing the Next Generation at St James': Our Youth Ministry Vision

*We will not hide them from their descendants;  
we will tell the next generation  
the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord,  
his power, and the wonders he has done. - Psalm 78:4*

According to Growing Young Disciples, the outsourcing of parenting, education, recreation, and spiritual formation - combined with the digitalization of the world - has led to a battle over the memory, identity, and formation of Gen Z (people aged 13-25), and even Gen Alpha (young teens and below). Research shows that young people in these generations long for authenticity, robust conversations, meaning, conviction, transcendence, and purpose. Former modes of discipleship by attraction, entertainment, or gimmicks are now insufficient and largely unwanted.

At St James, our hope is to develop a youth ministry that takes these generations seriously, allowing for genuine engagement with our young people. Not just for an hour on a Friday evening, but throughout the life of the church. We want to foster intergenerational relationships: enabling young people to see Christ embodied in others, to ask questions of older mentors, to serve alongside the church family, and to grow in love for the Church - not only the Youth Fellowship. We also want them to explore the deep things of God (theology) and learn to apply biblical teaching to their own lives. At the same time, we want to allow them to be young: to grow at their own pace and to enjoy friendship and laughter. How do we facilitate all this?

A culture of discipleship like this does not develop overnight. But what might it look like in five years' time? It could take many forms: a mentorship programme; discussions over donuts before or after church; ministry rotas that include young people; intergenerational



friendships; Bible studies and reading groups; youth-led initiatives. What is clear is that developing our youth ministry is not simply the job of a "youth worker." A joined-up, church-wide philosophy of youth ministry is essential.

That said, a dedicated youth ministry leader would bring the energy and focus needed to help drive these changes forward. With the help of seed funding from the National Church, we will be pursuing the appointment of someone to lead and guide this ministry. We budgeted for a large deficit in 2025, and we have not yet made it up, so taking on another long-term position carries risk. But investing in ministry and in people is, under God, how the Church grows. Please pray for God's guidance and provision as we take these steps in 2026.

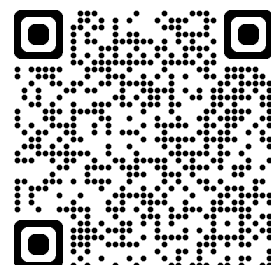

## Thomas Helliker Memorial

White Horse (Wiltshire) Trades  
Union Council is seeking  
financial donations to restore  
Thomas Helliker's tomb in St  
James Church Yard,



Trowbridge. The lettering on the tomb on both faces of the white marble tablets is damaged and becoming illegible.

They are seeking donations towards this appeal.

It is not only one of the most important monuments not just in the town but for historians and trades unionists everywhere. It is a memorial to a principled young man sometimes known as the Trowbridge Martyr who refused to testify against others and was hanged on his 19th birthday for allegedly burning down Littleton Mill when machinery was introduced that would have taken away their jobs.

They are aiming to raise the sum of £2,000. Any funds raised will be ring fenced for the restoration of the Grade II Listed box tomb. The Crowdfunder page is now live, [click here](#) or scan the QR code.

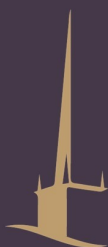

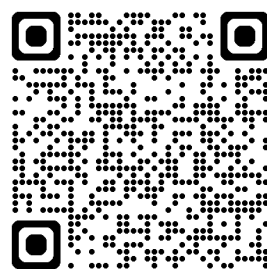
## OUR CHARITY FOCUS FOR JANUARY



For 70 years, Open Doors has stood alongside our persecuted brothers and sisters in Christ, strengthening and supporting those who count the cost of following Jesus. Their underground networks operate in more than 70 countries, including some of the most dangerous places on earth in which to call yourself a Christian. We are the body of Christ. It is unlikely that any of us will meet our persecuted church family but our prayers, advocacy and financial help can help OD shine light into the darkest places on earth. Our support can show our persecuted family that they aren't alone. Keep on praying, keep on supporting, keep on speaking out!

The **World Watch List** is Open Doors' annual ranking of the 50 countries where Christians face the most extreme persecution. On the interactive map on their website you can explore the country profiles to find information, stories and prayers for each of the countries, along with ways to pray and stand with your persecuted church family.

You can also invite your MP to the World Watch List parliamentary launch on Wednesday 14 January 2026, where they'll hear testimonies of persecution and recommendations on how to respond.

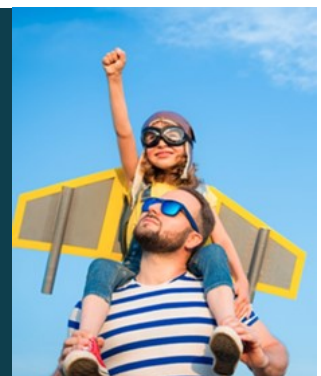

# Christmas Tree Festival 2025

December 2025 saw our 9th Christmas Tree festival take place in the church with 80 trees showcasing Trowbridge schools, churches, charities and organisations. Consensus of opinion from visitors and those involved was that this year was the biggest and best festival so far.



A huge thanks goes to all involved in any way from donating mince pies, stewarding, preparing the church and clearing it in time for Sunday's service, it really has been a whole church collaboration! A special thanks goes to Dilys and her team of helpers who ensured all proceedings went to plan.

The Festival was very well attended, a rough count, excluding children is over 1,300! The delivery of the church Christmas cards before the event definitely contributed to some of our visitors attending.

Early indications are that the festival has raised over £3,000. This will be split between 3 charities; Stand by Me, Storehouse Foodbank and the Mothers' Union Literacy Program.

It will be a challenge to beat this for 2026 but with enquiries for seven new trees next year our 10th year may well succeed!
